REBUILD AND REHABILITATE **LIVES**

The stigma surrounding addiction and drug use has damaged the lives of our community members and their loved ones. Communities of color have been especially vulnerable, often facing family shame and barriers to receiving adequate and vital treatment. Sadly, society's initial instinct is to criminalize victims, trapping them in a vicious cycle of relapse and isolation.

Our ACCESS Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) continues to focus on rehabilitating the vulnerable communities we serve and challenging the notion of criminalizing and punishing victims of addiction. This past year, we hired Substance Abuse Advocate, Ahmad Ballout, whose life's work has been dedicated to supporting the rehabilitation of victims. Ahmad works hand-in-hand with the Dearborn Police Department to identify those most vulnerable and direct them to appropriate resources. Through this partnership, ASAP is working to fill the gaps of a broken justice system by changing what it means to protect and serve our community.

In the wake of a growing and fatal opioid epidemic, we in Dearborn—like so many communities across the U.S. and around the world—must build systems and practices that allow for proper healing and second chances.

FINDING STABILITY AND SUCCESS

In the blink of an eye, the walls of Luqman Al-Janabi's home in Iraq were replaced by a difficult journey across the ocean to an unfamiliar land. For many refugees, like Luqman and his family, there is pain in the uncertainty of leaving home behind.

Luqman and his family came to the U.S. with limited English language proficiency and few opportunities on the horizon, however they never lost hope. Soon after arriving in the U.S., Luqman found support at ACCESS, enrolling in our English as a Second Language (ESL) and Entrepreneurial Growth courses to enhance his language skills and acquire the tools to grow his own business.

Given his own experiences as a new immigrant, Luqman was acutely aware of the fact that many new immigrants, along with underserved, low-income and elderly community members, could not afford reliable transportation for personal appointments. After months of hard work and determination, Luke, LLC, a non-emergency medical transportation company, was established, with Luqman as the proud owner.

This unique company has become an essential resource within the community. Not only has it provided Luqman with economic self-sufficiency and the personal fulfillment of supporting his community, but he continues to create employment opportunities for others in our workforce development programs. But above all, the skills, tools and support Luqman received through ACCESS has given him the chance at independence, creating a new home for his family.

EMPOWERING FAMILIES

Studies show that children in underserved communities are exposed to an average of fifteen hundred fewer words an hour than their counterparts. By the age of four that gap has grown to more than 32 million words.

For one mother, Maria Lopez, leveling the playing field for her children meant turning to ACCESS for support. Holding her 6-month-old daughter, Emily, in one arm and her books in the other, Maria joined various ACCESS programs and courses with one goal – to give her children a fair and equal chance to succeed.

While pregnant with her second child, Maria had to travel back to Mexico, where she gave birth to a beautiful girl that she named Hannah. The joy of this occasion was quickly overshadowed by the fact that she was forced to leave her newborn daughter in Mexico, until she could obtain the necessary paperwork to bring her back home to the U.S.

Determined to reunite her family, even amidst strong anti-immigrant sentiment, Maria continued taking ESL courses with ACCESS, enrolled in our U.S. Citizenship Preparation course, and engaged in various initiatives to better support her children's academic success.

With the support of our Adult and Family Learning Center, Maria was finally able to bring Hannah home, attain her US Citizenship, and continues to plan for her family's successful future.

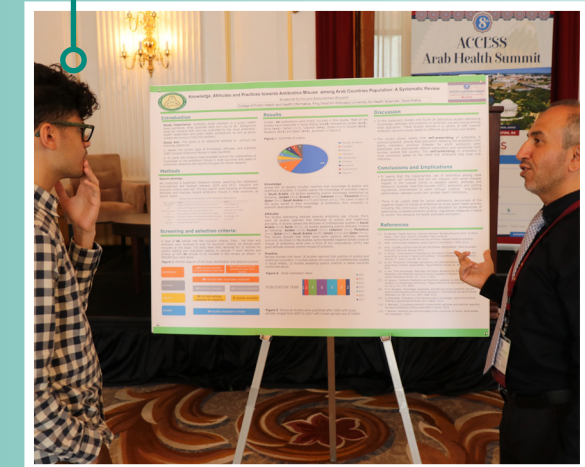

UPLIFTING VOICES

Recognizing that the critical voices of women have been historically underrepresented, the Arab American National Museum (AANM)—in partnership with New York’s renowned Ping Chong and Company—brought together six Arab American women for a powerful stage production, titled *Undesirable Elements/Dearborn*. In the context of culture and identity, Rasha Ahmed Almulaiki, Shahad Atiya, Layla Elabed, Mary Kamal Gagnon, Nuzmeya Bader Elder, PhD, and Salam Aboulhassan took to the stage to share their own stories of survival and resilience when faced with everything from happiness and celebration to violence, sexual assault and emotional trauma.

What was intended as a production aimed at giving a first-hand narrative of life in Dearborn, naturally established itself into a space for women from marginalized communities to reveal the multi-layered stories that shaped their lives, from the triumphant to the tragic. This raw and moving performance, in addition to its successful artistry, helped elevate the voices of women of color. The participants were met with resounding praise and were celebrated for their courage and conviction.

Undesirable Elements was more than a beautifully orchestrated AANM stage production, it promoted the unapologetic declaration of one’s own truth and stood as a proclamation to the world that Arab American women’s stories are an integral part of the American narrative.

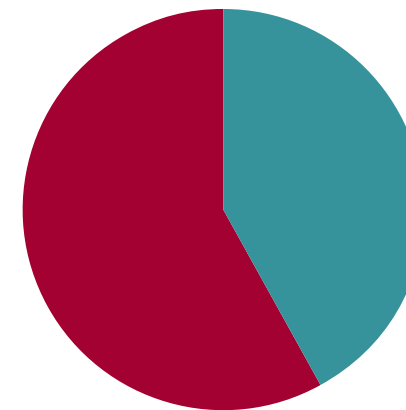

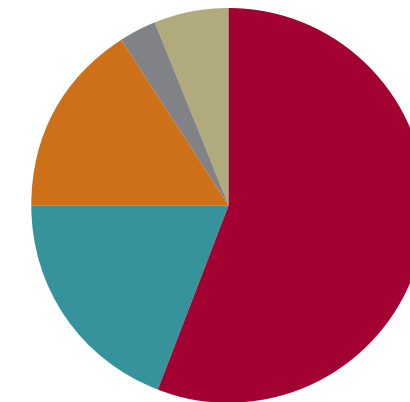

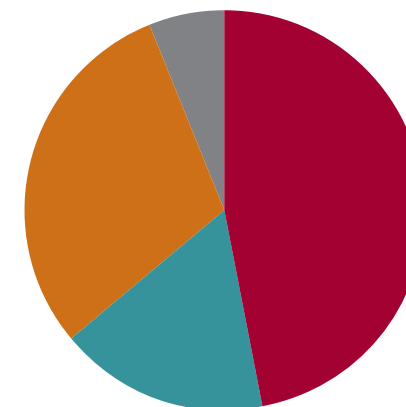

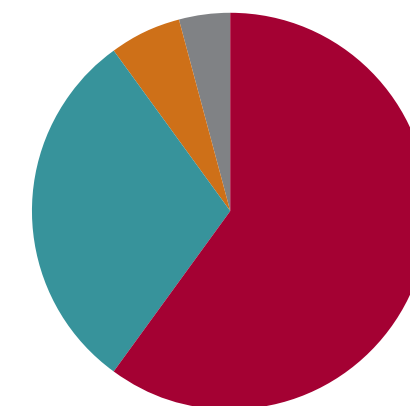

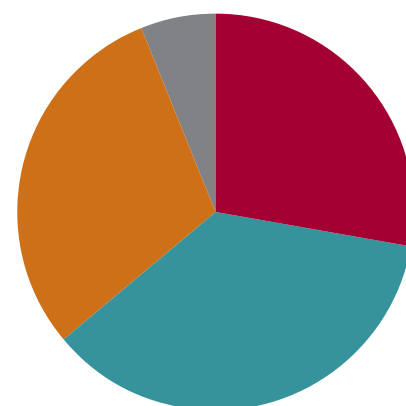
